	2.1	COVID-19 Telehealth Assessment Centre (CTAC) – Charlotte Bryant			
		and Ashleigh O'Rourke			
	•	In response to an increasing number of patients with COVID-19, St George			
		Hospital CTAC was established to minimise potential morbidity from			
		COVID-19 in community dwelling patients.			
	•	COVID-19 CTAC management aims to:			
		- Provide a standardised patient assessment and management algorithm			
		for community dwelling patients with COVID-19, consistent with NSW			
		Health Agency for Clinical Innovation "Caring for adults with COVID-19			
		in the community"			

- Detect early deterioration of patients with COVID-19 and facilitate transfer for inpatient care
- Decrease unexpected patient presentations to the St George Hospital Emergency Department
- Reduce the burden of COVID-19 illness at St George Hospital
- Support patients during their isolation at home
- Release patients from isolation when deemed to be no longer infectious (as per national public health guidelines)
- Remote Monitoring Service (RMS)
 - Provided patients with a pulse oximeter to assist with monitoring
 - The device is used to provide a reading of both the oxygen levels in the blood and heart rate
 - Patients were asked to use the device twice a day
 - In addition to patients calling us for any concerns they had, we asked them to call the CTAC Mobile if their oxygen saturation was reading 94% or lower or heart rate reading was 100 or more. In the times the CTAC Mobile was not in operation, the patients were advised to call an ambulance and notify them of their COVID-19 status
- Lorena Matthews thanked the CTAC team for the support offered to our pregnant women.

	8.1	Clinical Council Report – Rod Lynch			
	•	Report for the Clinical Council meeting held on 26 April 2022 was circulated			
		with the agenda paperwork.			
	•	The General Manager reported on PPE recycling.			
	•	Presentation at Clinical Council on "Safety Attitudes Questionnaire". During			
		discussions following the presentation it was raised that the questionnaire			
		may confirm some safety issues which have been known for some time.			
		Angela Karooz advised that Readiness Assessment has highlighted that we			
		are good at data analysis and understanding of issues. We now need to put			
		action plans in place. However, we have had a number of competing			
		priorities such as COVID-19 and the impact on our Emergency Department,			
		Intensive Care Unit and CTAC. Operations will always take priority. We			
		continue to do great work around falls prevention. We are also looking at			
		patient deterioration in Aged Care. Lauren Sturgess advised that she			
		appreciates the concern around risk and safety, especially in our Aged			
		Care Precinct. We acknowledge the risks and have a lot of systems in			
		place to manage these risks.			
	8.2	General Manager Report – Angela Karooz			
	•	St George Hospital Intensive Care Unit Accreditation			
		St George Hospital Intensive Care Team have been successful regaining			
		accreditation of training with the College of Intensive Care Medicine. The			
		college's Accreditation Committee commended and congratulated staff on			
		the efforts and approach to create an exceptional training program for our			
		trainees. The team work, increased teaching opportunities, introduction of			
		the Intensive Care Grand Rounds and other initiatives have been			
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transformational, and we proudly applaud the collective Intensive Care Team.

Wellbeing Initiatives

Tina Saleeb has been named as the St George Hospital Wellbeing Ambassador. This is an exciting opportunity for organisational change. The Chief Executive support has been provided to backfill Tina's substantive position one day per week for twelve months.

Readiness Assessment

SGH undertook an Accreditation Readiness Assessment visit prior to Easter. Action plans and strategies are being completed based on the feedback in preparation for the formal accreditation in June 2022.

- Health Services Union (HSU) Industrial Action
 The HSU has advised of more strikes and a campaign against the NSW government before next year's state election. Paramedics, cleaners, security guards and radiographers took up to four-hour stoppages across the state's metro and regional hospitals in support of a 5.5% pay increase to make up the real wage cuts.
- Hurstville COVID Testing Clinic
 The Hurstville Community Health Centre COVID-19 Testing Service has closed after almost two years supporting the area's diverse communities.
 The clinic was set up in April 2020 in response to the need to quickly scale up public testing capacity and was SESLHD's first community-based COVID-19 testing facility. The clinic was especially important for the culturally and linguistically diverse communities in the St George area.

8.3 Nursing Update – Lauren Sturgess

- Lauren Sturgess advised that their main focus is on workforce shortages.
 We are experiencing a higher than normal vacancy rate, partly due to post COVID burnout. We are also experiencing higher sick leave notifications.
 Strategies are in place.
- We continue to work with the Rotary of Hurstville regarding the upgrade of the outside grassed area (between James Laws House and the Tower Ward Block). The Grants have been formalised and we are securing the contractors. It is estimated that works will be approximately 3-4 months with commencement around July 2022.
- Clinical areas are focused on the upcoming accreditation.
- Industrial action we are working with the Nurses Association to minimise disruption to patient care.
 - Elizabeth Martin asked how we have managed to cover shifts during the recent industrial actions. The Committee was advised that we cover shifts through the hospital's casual pool, nursing agencies or offer additional shifts to part-time staff. As advised at our previous meeting, we have created a promotional video which will assist with recruitment internationally.
- International Day of the Midwife 5 May 2022
 International Nurses Day 12 May 2022
 We will be holding an event to celebrate our nursing staff which will include awards and activities.

8.4 Quality and Safety Update - Sandra Grove The April report did not raise any concerns with the Patient Safety Improvement Team. Report for March 2022: No Harm Score 1's reported 3 x Harm Score 2's Safety Attitudes Questionnaire (SAQ) Staff have been asked to complete the SAQ as it is an important tool for measuring safety culture and provides staff in all roles (clinical and nonclinical) with an opportunity to anonymously share their values, attitudes, perceptions and beliefs around the safety culture of their ward/unit or department. The aim of the survey is to improve quality care for patients and patient safety. The survey focusses on six key components: The safety of where you work Your work conditons Your perceptions of management - Your stress recognition Your teamwork culture Your job satisfaction We have completed Part 2 Readiness Assessment. Feedback will identify gaps and areas that we need to focus on. Accreditation from Monday 6 June to Friday 10 June 2022. 8.5 Stage 3 Redevelopment Update - Ella Stathis The artist impression of the new Ambulatory Care Building is now available to view.
