- Current employee of St George Hospital
- Willingness to work fulltime whilst undergoing orientation and leave relief opportunities
- Demonstrated engagement in professional development of self
- Statement of 3 key management qualities you consider essential for leading and managing a ward/unit and staff and how they apply to you
- 2 examples outlining how you have managed a problem within your clinical unit
- Support from your current line manager in writing (email/letter)
