a. Describe & interpret the clinical image of the patient (2 Marks)

1 Mark for description:

Facial flushing on elevation of the arms +/- fullness in anterior neck

1 Mark for Interpretation:

Superior vena caval syndrome +/- Pemberton's sign

b. List 4 causes of this clinical picture (4 Marks)

 - Lymphoma (10%)
 - Metastatic neoplasm (10%)
 - Non-neoplastic (10%)
 - o Thrombosis
 - o Benign tumours
 - Aortic aneurysm
 - Thyroid enlargement
 - o Irradiation
 - o Histoplasmosis
 - \circ TB
 - o Syphilis

c. List 8 side effects associated with chemotherapy (8 Marks)

- 1/2 Mark each from:
 - Nausea & vomiting
 - Renal failure
 - Cardiac failure
 - ACS
 - Venous thrombosis
 - Arrythmias
 - Neutropenia
 - Pancytopenia
 - Anaemia

- Thrombocytopenia
- Tumour lysis syndrome
- Typhlitis (caecal necrosis)
- HUS
- Haemorrhagic cystitis
- Hair loss
- Stomatitis
- Beau's lines
