These awards are acknowledgement of the hard work of healthcare workers across NSW, looking after stroke patients on the front lines, every day (and night!). On December 1st a small group from this team were able to gather in Sydney for the awards ceremony, representing our colleagues from across the state. The NSW Telestroke Service was thrilled to

be awarded both the Patient Safety First Award and the Secretary's Award for Integrated Value Based Care.

This edition, the Reperfusion Times spotlights the Murrumbidgee Local Health District. Dr Martin Jude and Dr Paul Rees in Wagga Wagga partner with the NSW TSS to provide one of two examples or our Hybrid model of care. 

Murrumbidgee LHD

This issue we visit the Murrumbigee Local Health District and its referring sites Wagga Wagga, Griffith and Deniliquin Hospitals.

Neurologist Spotlight MLHD

Dr Martin Jude and Dr Paul Rees | MLHD Neurologists

Martin- I moved to Wagga Wagga almost 30 years ago and set up a neurology practice with a special interest in Stroke. In 2007 we opened a 4 bed Acute Stroke Unit at Wagga Wagga Base Hospital which has since increased to 5 beds. In 2008 we started thrombolysing patients. Wagga Wagga looks after patients from across the Murrumbidgee LHD and for a long time we supported



Griffith Hospital to thrombolyse patients prior to the advent of the NSW Statewide Telestroke Service. Paul moved to Wagga Wagga in 2021 and joined the neurology practice.

FUN FACT: *Martin* - On the weekends and when I'm not working in our busy service, I enjoy spending time on the farm, but I'm a hopeless Rugby tragic and my devotion to the Wallabies takes priority over most things!

Griffith

Griffith was the 1st of the MLHD sites to implement NSW TSS in May 21. The implementation embedded a standardised process for stroke recognition and escalation pathways of hyperacute stroke management. Thanks to engaged and committed clinicians, Griffith recently achieved a door to needle time of 35 minutes.

Deniliquin

Prior to implementation of the NSW TSS, Deniliquin was on bypass for stroke care. The first patient to receive thrombolysis at Deniliquin after the implementation of the NSW TSS, could not speak more highly of the care she received and recorded her story. Dr Rachel James and Dr Ben James also spoke to their experience using the NSW TSS, as Rural VMO GPs working in regional NSW. These videos were developed as resources to build awareness around stroke care and were launched during National Stroke Week.

Wagga Wagga

In July 2021 Wagga Wagga went live on the NSW TSS, providing a hybrid model of care with the local neurologists. The incredible team effort involved over the many years of building the Wagga Wagga Stroke Service, was also recognised through a World Stroke Organisation Gold Angels award for Q3 2022. Being engaged in the NSW TSS has led to a quality improvement project with the Canberra Hospital. This involves collaborating to reduce the delays when transporting patients to Canberra for ECR.

Incident Reporting: Critical/high priority issues

For critical/high priority issues that occur in the absence of the Telestroke Neurologists, a staff member should call the Statewide Service Desk (SWSD) on **1300 285 533**

- Once the call is connected, press # when asked for Stafflink number
- From the Menu options, select Option 2 (Clinical applications or issues affecting patient care)
- Advise the call is regarding Telestroke, explain the issue and its criticality. The call will be transferred directly to the respective technical team to troubleshoot and resolve both during and after business hours

Incident Reporting: Non-emergency issues

For non-emergency issues and routine support, report directly to the Statewide Service Desk (SWSD) via 1300 285 533 or using the SARA incident form <u>SARA Service Portal</u>

It is important to clearly identify that the incident is for Telestroke. To do this select '**Telestroke**' as the Business Service/Application in the SARA form

Access Requests:

To request access to Telestroke applications, call the Statewide Service Desk (SWSD) on **1300 285 533** and they will direct the ticket to the appropriate team to arrange for access.
