The joyful sound of children playing is now a regular event outside St George Hospital thanks to a new playground and garden that was officially opened on 1 February 2023.

The space was transformed at the end of 2022 thanks to a grant received from the Department of Infrastructure in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Hurstville.

Member for Banks, The Honourable Mr David Coleman, was instrumental in progressing the grant and attended the official opening alongside Mr Tobi Wilson, Chief Executive, South Eastern Sydney Local Health District, Ms Kim Olesen, Executive Director Operations, South Eastern Sydney Local

Health District and Ms Angela Karooz, General Manager, St George Hospital. Other guests included representatives from Hurstville Rotary, Fairy Sparkle OAM and staff who were involved in the planning stages of the playground.

To give the new play equipment a workout, the event was also attended by children from Lorikeet Early Learning Centre, St George Hospital, who gave the slide and rope bridge the thumbs up.

Ms Lauren Sturgess, Director of Nursing and Midwifery, said the garden and play area are an outstanding addition to St George Hospital.

"It cannot be underestimated the impact the upgrade to this area has had on the Hospital. It has lifted the entire space, creating a purpose-built area for paediatric inpatients as well as children of inpatients that will lessen the stress and strain of a Hospital admission. Creating a space for staff to have a break outside the clinical area is critical to rest and recharge on their breaks," Ms Sturgess said.

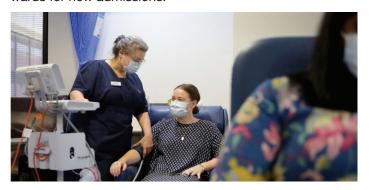

#### Oatley Lions Club

In addition, the funds were also used to purchase infant stethoscopes for each bed in the Special Care Nursery; and a Smileyscope virtual reality headset which is used as a distraction therapy for children to improve patient and caregiver experiences during clinical procedures involving needles.

# With Your Support

Our Winter 2023 Appeal is aiming to raise \$24,000 to purchase a SaeboReJoyce Upper Extremity Rehabilitation Workstation and an ALFESS Functional Electrical Stimulation System for St George Hospital's Rehabilitation Unit.

Rehabilitation is a specialised field committed to delivering person-centred care and developing therapeutic relationships to enable the best possible outcomes.

The SaeboReJoyce is a hand and upper extremity rehabilitation workstation designed for orthopedic and neurological patients who exhibit impaired function of the arm and hand. The computerised training system provides standardised upper limb exercises representing activities of daily living. The SaeboReJoyce is based on the latest advances in neurorehabilitation research. Saebo's task-oriented training system involves a range of activity-based games that test speed, endurance, coordination, range of motion, strength, timing and cognitive demand. The games are fully customisable to match the client's therapy needs.

The ALFESS Functional Electrical Stimulation System assists with improving gait when foot drop, diminished foot and toe clearance is present. The device is applied to the upper part of the lower leg. During walking, sensors identify speed and angles of the leg to adapt to the walking pattern. An algorithm processes the information and sends out electrical impulses to the nerves to lift the forefoot.

Thank you for supporting the rehabilitation treatment and care of patients with conditions such as stroke, neurological conditions, spinal surgeries, trauma, limb amputation and deconditioning post medical or surgical admissions.
